- Erasmus+ is also applicable to internships or work experiences – contact your university's ERASMUS+ office!
- Browse offers by the State Labour Agency (Arbeitsagentur)
- Most universities have services for finding jobs and internships





Legal requirements

- If you are a citizen of an EU / EEA country:
- You have the same rights to jobs, internships etc. as German citizens
- If you are a student, you should respect certain time limits –
- you won't have time to work too much during your studies
- take into consideration tax rules students pay much less taxes, but only up to a maximum number of working hours per week (usually 20 hours)! If you work more than 20 hours a week you will have to pay insurance contributions. You can earn 520 euros a month without paying taxes.

If you are NOT an EU citizen:

- If you are enrolled as a student in Germany, you have rights to work within certain limits (usually 120 days per year)
- - If your study programme requires a compulsory internship, you are allowed to fulfil these requirements
- In any case if a company is interested in you and can prove that there are no German applicants for the position with a similar qualification, you can usually get a work permit

Dual Programmes – studying with an internship

- Studying + (intensified) practical experience in a company
- For practically oriented students
- Integrated studying + apprenticeship vs. studying for fully employed persons vs. full-time studies with integrated internships
- Alternating months or days
- Application either through a university or via a company
- Often in fields which were traditionally NOT considered to be part of universities or other fields of academic education e.g. social care.
- Programmes offered usually through Universities of Applied Science
- Enables a smooth career start, often accompanied by a company salary
- Continuing theoretical studies at a later stage is more difficult

Application tips

- Contact companies which you are interested in explain your interest and apply (just like German students would)
- Be open-minded, active and alert! Sign up to email alerts.
- Solid knowledge of German improves your chances considerably.
- BE CAREFUL with private agencies some of them are serious and reliable, others are not. In any case – they will charge you A LOT OF MONEY!
- State services (such as by DAAD) are free of charge!
